

"When Israel came out of Egypt, and the house of Jacob from an alien people, Judah was his sanctuary, and Israel his dominion"

I remember singing these words from the time when I was just 8 years old. They are the opening verses of *Psalm 114*. Very comforting to a young child. The Psalm goes on to celebrate the Red Sea being opened to create a safe path for the people and the river Jordan being driven back on its course. The whole land rejoiced:

"The mountains skipped like rams and the little hills like yearling sheep"

There's an image with which to conjure. What a wonderful place Israel must have been in the imaginative mind of this young chorister, and what a wonderful place it must remain if God himself had led the people to that place. Israel was intended to be a sanctuary, <u>a safe place</u> where people could live with God and **Jeru-Shalom** was to be the *City of Peace*! (That's why Catholics call the holiest place with the tabernacle in church, the "Sanctuary" because "Here God lives among men" as in Rev 21v3) Later at secondary school I had a Jewish friend;

Adrian Reema was a little over weight and always in trouble and I was often in trouble with him. Teachers used to yell his name down the corridors, **REEMA!** He came all the way from

Tottenham because the schools in Enfield were said to be better. His family were jewellers. I remember that he celebrated his *Bar Mitzva* at 13 and we kind of celebrated with him in the knowledge that, unlike the rest of us, in his community he was now officially grown up. Although he diligently insisted that he didn't believe in Jesus, he faithfully carried his little "*Gideon*"

New Testament which we had all been given, because it included the Psalms. We had things in common because we both knew those same Psalms. Being the only (active) Jewish boy in a school with an atheist agenda, he was surprised to find another kid who seemed to know **HIS Psalms!** So, here's another one... Psalm 41:

BLESSED is he that considereth the poor and needy, the Lord shall deliver him in the time of trouble. The Lord preserve him, and keep him alive, that he may be blessed upon earth

I am finding it difficult now to read my Old Testament scriptures in the knowledge of what is happening in Israel/Gaza today. Given that so much of what we call "Salvation History" in the Hebrew/Old Testament is an ongoing traumatic account (from 1500 years "BC") of the survival of God's people against all the odds in the face of never ending political upheavals, how does modern Israel stand in the context of its own Biblical heritage? The reading this week from Wisdom is a celebration of that ancient memory of the night of the Passover, literally; "When Israel came out of Egypt". It portrays Israel as the unlikely winners after so many generations of oppression & slavery. I fear as we learn more about what Israel is actually perpetrating against the defenceless children of

Gaza, it is no longer a valid image for today. The tide of public opinion is turning, and not least even among a groundswell of outspoken western Rabbis. I fear it is too little and too late. There is the greater dilemma that Judaism itself could unravel...

REEMA! I hope you are still out there somewhere and I hope you are still reading those Psalms! May God have mercy on us all! *God Bless Fr K*

For in secret the holy children of good people offered sacrifices and with one accord agreed to the divine law, that the saints would share alike the same things, both blessings and dangers; and already they were singing the praises of the fathers.

Second reading Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

Brothers & Sisters: Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. For by it the people of old received their commendation. By faith Abraham obeyed when receive as an inheritance. And he went out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he went to live in the land of promise, as in a foreign land, living in tents with Isaac & Jacob, heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city that has foundations, whose designer & builder is God. By faith Sarah herself received power to conceive, even when she was past the age, since she considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore, from one man, and him as good as dead, were born descendants as many as the stars of heaven and as many as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore. These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. For people who speak thus make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of that land from which they had gone out, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city. By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, & he who had received the promises was in the act of offering up his only son, of whom it was said, 'Through Isaac shall your offspring be named.' He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead, from which, figuratively speaking, he did receive him back.

Alleluia, Stay awake and be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.

Gospel Luke 12:32-48

At that time: Jesus said to his disciples, 'Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give to the needy. Provide yourselves with money bags that do not grow old, with a treasure in the heavens that does not fail, where no thief approaches and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. 'Stay dressed for action and keep your lamps burning, and be like men who are waiting for their master to come home from the wedding feast, so that they may open the

door to him at once when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will dress himself for service, and have them recline at table, and he will come and serve them. If he comes in the second watch, or in the third, and finds them awake, blessed are those servants! But know this, that if the master of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have left his house to be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.' Peter said, 'Lord, are you telling this parable for us or for all?' And the Lord said, 'Who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom his master will set over his household, to give them their portion of food at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his master will find so doing when he comes. Truly, I say to you, he will set him over all his possessions. But if that servant says to himself, "My master is delayed in coming", and begins to beat the male & female servants, and to eat and drink and get drunk, the master of that servant will come on a day when he does not expect him and at an hour he does not know, and will cut in pieces and put him with the unfaithful. And that servant who knew his master's will but did not get ready or act according to his will, will receive a severe beating. But the one who did not know, and did what deserved a beating, will receive a light beating. Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more.'

The following extract, was written 22yrs ago but it could have been written yesterday! - It is part of a letter written by a 23yr old girl, Rachel, to her mother in 2003, less than a month before she was killed by an Israeli military bulldozer.

"This has to stop. I think it is a good idea for us all to drop everything and devote our lives to making this stop. I don't think it's an extremist thing to do anymore. I still really want to dance around and have boyfriends. But I also want this to stop. Disbelief and horror is what I feel. Disappointment. I am disappointed that this is the base reality of our world and that we, in fact, participate in it. This is not at all what I asked for when I came into this world. This is not at all what the people here asked for when they came into this world. This is not the world you and Dad wanted me to come into when you decided to have me. This is not what I meant when I looked out at the Lake and said: 'This is the wide world and I'm coming to it.' I did not mean that I was coming into a world where I could live a comfortable life and possibly, with no effort at all, exist in complete unawareness of my participation in genocide".

Rachel Corrie was an American peace activist from Washington, crushed to death by an Israeli bulldozer on 16 March 2003, while undertaking nonviolent direct action to protect the home of a Palestinian family from demolition. Since then Rachel's words about peace, justice and human dignity from her journals and emails from her time in Palestine have been published in books, turned into plays and dramatic readings, they have all been collected here:

"I should at least mention that I am also discovering a degree of strength and of basic ability for humans to remain human in the direst of circumstances - which I also haven't seen before. I think the word is dignity. I wish you could meet these people. Maybe, hopefully, someday you will."
